Purpose Clauses

Purpose clauses express the reason why someone did something.

When the subject of the main clause is the same as the subject of the purpose clause:

To + Infinitive

He plays the guitar to free his emotions.

In order to + Infinitive

He plays the guitar in order to free his emotions.

So as to + Infinitive

He plays the guitar so as to free his emotions.

When the subject of the main clause is different from the subject of the purpose clause:

| So that + subject + can/will | Her mother will give her some money <u>so that</u> she can go to the concert. |
|---|--|
| So that + subject + could/would | Her mother gave her some money so that she could go to the concert. |
| In order that + subject + can/will | Her mother will give her some money in order that she can go to the concert. |
| In order that + subject + could/ would | Her mother gave her some money <u>in</u> order that she could go to the concert. |
| For+pronombre objeto+to infinivite | Her mother gave her the money <u>for</u> <u>her to go</u> to the concert |
